

Speaker Biographies



Matt Ryan is currently serving his seventh term as Coconino County's Supervisor and is current Chair of the Board of Supervisors. He has chaired the Board six times in prior terms. His district includes the City of Williams, portions of the City of Flagstaff, Northern Arizona University, part of the City of Sedona, as well as several unincorporated areas of southwestern Coconino County.

Matt was born in Pennsylvania, fifth of ten children. Mr. Ryan moved to Flagstaff in 1982. He served in the United States Marine Corps. Mr. Ryan received a Bachelor of Science and Secondary Teaching Certification from Northern Arizona University. He previously worked for a biotechnology corporation, with Flagstaff Arboretum in an educational capacity, and as free-lance writer. He also started a small business making recreation trail maps.

Matt is currently chair of the Rural Transportation Advisory Council (RTAC). In current leadership roles Matt serves as chair of the medium county caucus of the County Supervisor's Association (CSA) and Northern Arizona Council of Government's (NACOG) Transportation Advisory Committee. He has served in many other leadership roles and was involved in the creation or development of the Northern Arizona Intergovernmental Public Transportation Authority (NAIPTA) and the creation of the Flagstaff Metropolitan Planning Organization, now MetroPlan. He also served as President of CSA, chair of NACOG's Executive Community, and chair of MetroPlan. Matt is a longtime dedicated advocate to bring the necessary funding for our transportation infrastructure. In coordination with the City of Flagstaff, Coconino County and the City implemented propositions 403 and 406 to generate local revenue for infrastructure improvements and maintenance. Throughout his time in office, he has collaboratively worked to build the social and political will to meet Arizona's infrastructure needs in the 21st century and to expand transportation systems.



Steve Stratton was appointed to the State Transportation Board in 2015 by Governor Ducey and is currently the Chairman of the Board.

Stratton has been engaged in transportation issues and with the State Transportation Board through long service in public works and city management. Born and raised in Globe, he served as that city's public works director and city manager. He then was public works director and acting manager for Gila County. Now retired from public service, Stratton works for S&S Consulting, a project management firm.

"I am extremely appreciative of the appointment," Stratton said. "I am concerned about the transportation needs of the state as a whole and the available funding associated with meeting those needs."



Gary Knight was appointed to the State Transportation Board in 2018 by Governor Ducey.

Mr. Knight is a Yuma native and after spending six years in the Navy returned to the private sector owning his own business, a local boat dealership. Mr. Knight sold the business, after 35 years and retired in 2009.

In 2014, Mr. Knight took office on Yuma City Council and was then re-elected in 2018 to a second term and served three years as Deputy Mayor. As a Councilmember, Mr. Knight serves on the following boards and committees all of which are directly related to transportation:

Prior to his service on the State Transportation Board, Mr. Anderson graduated from the University of Arizona College of Agriculture with a major in Agronomy and a minor in Business. Mr. Anderson is a lifelong resident of the city of Maricopa and served on the committee to incorporate into a city prior to serving as the mayor from 2004–2008.

Karla Petty is the Federal Highway Administration's Arizona Division Administrator. In this capacity, she leads an office of professionals that deliver the Federal-aid Highway Program and discretionary grant highway projects in Arizona. She and her staff provide program & technical assistance, oversight and guidance to Arizona Department of Transportation, Metropolitan Planning Organizations, and other transportation partners. Through financial and technical assistance, the Arizona Division strives to improve highway safety, mobility, and livability while encouraging innovation. She serves as the Co-Chair for the Arizona Council for Transportation Innovation (ACTI).

Karla has over thirty years of experience in the highway transportation industry and has worked in seven states. She supports and encourages collaboration and partnerships to advance transportation. Karla was recognized with an FHWA Women Leader in Transportation Award in 2020.


Dallas Hammit currently serves as state engineer and deputy director for transportation. As leader of the Infrastructure Delivery and Operations Division (IDO), Transportation Systems Management and Operations Division (TSMO), and the Multimodal Transportation Division (MPD), he oversees development and delivery of the ADOT construction program, including environmental studies, engineering design, land acquisition and construction. He also supports the maintenance and operation of more than 6,000 miles of interstate and state highways in Arizona.

Dallas joined ADOT in June 1999 as senior resident engineer in the Yuma District. He later served both the Yuma and Prescott Districts as district engineer. In 2009, Dallas became deputy state engineer for operations, and in 2012, he became senior deputy for development. In 2014, Dallas was appointed State Engineer.
